MEXICAN 1000

The TRW ARC contingent to the Mexican 1000 Off Road Race, Al Lee, W6KQI, Doug Freeman, W6NHX, Greg Loegering, WN6SMS, and Greg's Dad, George, (who came along because he happens to own the airplane) left Torrance Airport bright and early Tuesday, October 31. After a customs stop in Tijuana we headed South along the West Coast of Baja toward our assigned check point — El Arco. Two and one-half hours later we were over the small village in the middle of the peninsula, and landed safely on the gravel strip there.

Having been preceded by the other check point communicator, (and team leader), Jim Coulter, WA6SHI, of San Diego, we were able to get on the air quickly to pass safe arrival traffic to Mac McGrew, W6YCZ. After setting up our campsite we proceeded to erect the second antenna, an end fed long wire, and began operations on 20 meters using Doug's FT-101.

Tuesday evening saw a fair amount of traffic for race participants being passed, mostly to the Start Line at Mexicali, but we closed down early to get rested for the predicted busy day ahead.

Wednesday morning we awoke all ready to check into the net at 0700 and prepare for the 0800 start, when we found that the generator would not start!!! With all the expert pit crew mechanics around it was soon diagnosed as a stuck valve and fixed just in time to get on at 0700. Band conditions were somewhat less than ideal on both 40 and 75 meters. With the net operating on 40, the long skip was in and La Paz was the only station we could hear reliably. Since part of the job was for each check point to copy reports of vehicle passage through all the other check points, operating was quite a problem. La Paz was forced to relay all the info back to the rest of the check points.

We broke up into teams of two, with Al and Jim working together and Greg and Doug the other shift — four hours on/four hours off. After night fell, we switched to 75 meters and conditions improved just in time since Parnelli Jones came roaring through just after dark, the first of many machines into and out of El Arco.

The four hours on/four off shifting went on through the night until noon Thursday, at which time things had slacked off considerably. We broke our camp,

packed our gear, loaded the trusty Bonanza and blasted off for Bahia De Los Angeles, a shower, and a good nights rest. Friday morning we went out in a Charter Fishing Boat, came back with some yellowtail, and a good time was had by all -- final score; Al, 1; George, 1; Sea Lion, 2. Seems that a sea lion started following us and as fast as we hooked them the sea lion went after the fish. Wonder how he liked those Treble Hooks!!

Anyway, after a fine lunch we again packed the plane and took off for a quick flight home into the smog of Southern California.

Thanks to all who monitored the frequency for us, waiting to see if we had traffic -- we were pretty busy, so didn't get much chance for friendly QSO's. The TRW club members we did hear were W6Y CZ, K6AWO, W6FQ, and W6UMC.

PHONE BAND EXPANSIONBy Ed Thornley, WA6JHD

As reported in last month's Cross-Talk and in QST for November, the FCC has acted to expand phone band allocations. We reproduce below the new assignments, furnished through the courtesy of John Griggs, W6KW, Director of the Southwestern Division of the ARRL. As before, operation in any portion of the band is permitted, provide you have that class of license or better. Extra class licensees can operate in their sub-band and in the Advanced and General/Conditional sub-bands. Advanced class licensees can operate in their own, and in the General/Conditional sub-band also.

Good news for Novices, they no longer need to operate crystal control, VFO operation is now permitted in the Novice sub-bands. Novices should note the new allocations, and the deletion of 2 - meter privileges.
