#### FROM THE SW DIVISION CONVENTION

A flock of us (a flock is a small herd) attended the Santa Maria Convention the weekend of October 21 and 22nd. One of the highlights of the meeting was an address by A. Prose Walker, WABW, Chief of the FCC Amateur and Citizens Radio Division. Your president, ever mindful of the responsibilities of high office remained sober and took notes! Background

Some predictions place the 1980 world amateur population at 600 to 800 thousand. If you doubt that this is realistic, consider that the CB population has grown from 40 thousand in 1958 to 815 thousand. (!) WOW

Portions of the HF spectrum are now being vacated as some of the pointto-point services go to satellite and cable channels for higher reliability. An international conference for HF frequency allocation wil probably be called within this decade and the vacated frequencies will be up for grabs.

Competitors will be amateurs and HF broadcast services. This makes the cheese pretty binding because broadcast is mostly government sponsored and some governments (France and the Scandivianians were cited) are not much impressed by ham radio.

Preparations for this conference must begin now, and the approach must be PROFESSIONAL in every sense. An impromptu appeal for spectrum space will not hack it at an ITU conference. At this point, Mr. Walker launched into something that had a familiar ring: a Plan of Action for preparation of a proposal. The steps in the plan are outlined below.

#### THE PLAN

- Take advantage of available opportunities for creating a world wide favorable impression of Ham Radio. In the present environment, the Amateur Satellite Service looks like the best vehicle for this. The amateur community should use the Satellites to generate as much international good will and publicity as possible. Make points. (somehow)!
- Formulate our allocation wish-list, and THINK BIG. For example,
  - All of 160 meters, exclusive amateur
  - 80 meters exclusive, world-wide

  - 40 meters, 7.0 to 7.5 MHz, exclusive, world-wide 30 meters, 10.5 to 11.0 MHz exclusive, world wide
  - 20 meters, 14.0 to 14.5 MHz exclusive, world wide

- 2. (cont)
  - 17 meters, 17.5 to 18.0 MHz exclusive, world-wide
  - 15 meters, 21.0 to 21.5 MHz exclusive, world-wide
  - 13 meters, 23.5 to 24.0 MHz exclusive, world-wide
  - 10 meters, 28.0 to 30.0 MHz exclusive, world-wide
  - (have a fall-back position: be prepared to give up 29.7 to 30.0)
- 3. Organize a PROFESSIONAL team for analysis, research and planning, and prepare a position paper for FCC to use with ITU. Basically an operations analysis and frequency allocation specialist job. Define requirements, define and justify solutions.
- 4. Coordinate the American position with amateurs doing same job in other countries. Horse-trade and line up support <u>before</u> the conference. There are amateurs with political influence in many other countries enlist their support early.
- 5. U.S. team members should try to get on the U.S. team for the ITU conference, to represent U.S. amateur interests directly.
- 6. The three elements required for success are:
  - Thorough and comprehensive planning
  - Good advance coordination with other teams and with FCC
  - A well-qualified delegation at the conference to advance and defend our position

#### Some observations:

- 1. Prose Walker, speaking as W4BW rather than as an FCC wheel, was more frank, and displayed more clarity in his presentation than most of us are used to from people in government.
- 2. ARRL has at present a "War Chest" of \$ 100,000 for ITU conference preparation activities to date. John Griggs indicated that the ARRL Board is starting to plan now. See the November 1971 editorial in QST.
- 3. If one asks how an individual, or a club like the TRW/ARC can contribute to this effort, a direct answer is hard to find. We do support the AMSAT-OSCAR program directly, and this is a contribution to the cause. Technical or diplomatic contributions to the frequency allocation issues are more difficult to visualize. Time will tell.

## RACES BULLETIN

OK you guys, you've heard the pitch from Dr. Richter and others, so you know a little bit about the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service.

The application forms are here, so I urge you to call me on extension 61673 and put your training and talents, as radio operators, to work on behalf of your neighbors and your community.

Under the new operational area plan, L. A. County RACES, under the overall supervision of County Sheriff, Peter J. Pitchess, has assumed responsibility for recruiting, training, and providing the administration for the entire operational area. This includes amateurs assigned to the cooperating cities, as well as those whose assignment involves support of the county Emergency Operating Centers (EOC) and the 14 district EOC's.

RACES is not in competition with other amateur radio organizations, such as AREC and MARS.

Nationally, RACES has the assigned role of providing auxiliary communications, as necessary, between agencies of local and state governments. RACES thus is complementary to AREC, MARS, and similar organizations.

RACES is a disciplined service and, as such, observes precise operational procedures and methods. Training and instruction in standardized communications procedures are provided to RACES members.

Individuals who join RACES in Los Angeles County may choose their normal duty station on the basis of geographical considerations and may expect, except under extreme emergency conditions, to fulfill their RACES commitment at that location.

For more information, call L. A. County RACES, 626-9511, extension 83126. If you are on VHF, call K6CPT weekdays, 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM on 147.28 MHz (AM), or 145.66 MHz (NBFM), and listen on 145.30 (NBFM).


