Announcements: The TRW/ARC came in fourth in the 1974 Field Day Contest for Class 5A.

Old Business: Freeman lamented that there are not sufficient members helping to sort QSL cards for the Bureau. As an experiment, Freeman will schedule a specific day each month to sort the cards in R5-1090A.

New Business: Veck announced that the November General Meeting will feature a demonstration of ham gear by Ray Hodges, W6AQP, of Atlas Radio.

Halligan presented the slate of nominees for the 1975 term of office, on behalf of the Nominating Committee. Their names will be presented at the November General Meeting, and the December CrossTalk will have the ballots for the vote of the membership.

CONVENTION REPORTBy ED THORNLEY, WA6JHD

The Southwestern Division of the ARRL held its 1974 convention in San Diego November 1 through 3. Judy and I arrived early in the afternoon of the 1st, checked into the Headquarters hotel, Town and Country in Mission Valley. We met Fred Reed W6UMC and his XYL Olive who had come down the night before.

We found our Division Director John Griggs, W6KW enjoying the weather under a bright sun and had a good eyeball QSO with him. That was our first chance to get acquainted with John, even though we've met him a number of times before. We swapped a few "war stories" and talked ham radio. John told us that the 1975 convention is already scheduled for Ventura.

At 1600 hours, the registration booth opened and we picked up our stuff-ID badges, dinner tickets, official program and a group of not-so-lucky door prize tickets. At 1800, the exhibits opened. We toured the 30-odd booths, drooled over the goodies, old and new, and wished that the money tree hadn't died. Nearly everything new is solid-state, and a lot of new gear features LED-type displays.

One of the not-so-new but very interesting displays was a genuine spark transmitter, representing the latest 1920 model. This 1/2 KW rig was actually operated for brief intervals under special dispensation of the FCC. Along with this rig was a collection of early model receivers, both home-brew and factory built. Anybody remember the National SW-3?

We had dinner out and relaxed the rest of Friday, including a little heckling of the piano player in the lounge of the Town and Country.

Saturday morning was the official opening of the convention. A full day of technical talks filled the program. We didn't get to all of them, but want to highlight a couple that we thought were exceptional.

One of these concerned current thinking at FCC and was presented by A. Prose Walker, W4BW who is chief of the Amateur and Citizens Division of the FCC. Prose comes on real straight - some of his comments were a bit disturbing. Do you know that the ranks of licensed amateurs are being depleted at the rate of 350 to 450 a month? Prose is concerned and so should the rest of us. What is the FCC thinking? How about a code-less amateur license? Yes, very serious study is being devoted to a new class of amateur. Prose indicated that they are considering a dual system of amateur licenses - one system retaining most of our present structure starting at Novice and working up through General, Advanced and Extra, for those primarily interested in the HF bands. The second system, emphasizing VHF/UHF would start with a no-code "Communicator" ticket, working up through two more new classes (5-WPM) leading to a superior grade of ticket for the serious VHF/UHF experimenter.

Convention Report (Cont'd)

These are of course only in the early thinking stages, but we gather that Prose and his fellow FCC types are trying to counter the big trend towards "bootleg" CB operations. He said that, while over four million CB rigs have been marketed, they have only issued 900,000 CB licences. Since we all like to talk on the radio, why not make it a bit easier for John Q. Citizen to do it legally, by means of a simple code-less ham ticket. Who knows, with this type of a place to get your feet wet, what it could lead to?

Mr. Walker also touched on a couple of other activities that affect our avocation. A possible new scheme of issuing call signs, and some of the important work that is going on and must be finished before the next general meeting of the International Telecommunications Union. The ITU is that august body that decides who is going to get what part of the spectrum for what purpose. And if you think that we hams have a god-given right to our bands, you had better change your thinking! Prose points out, as he has often said in the past, that if we amateurs can make a good case, we can retain our bands, and maybe even expand them. Much of the international commercial communications is now shifting to cable and satellite, and there will be opportunities to acquire additional spectrum for ham operations - if we can justify it. He strongly suggests that we all support the ARRL in formulating a good plan to go for new space in the spectrum at the next general meeting of the ITU, which is coming up in the late '70s.

Bumped into Bill Dews K6AWO, Frank Cartier WA6RAY, Ed Arn WA3FVG/6 and Walt Ordway WA6JZO who had car-pooled down to San Diego for the day. Later on they carried out Bill's earlier threat to invade our room for 807's. I think we fooled them though, as it was actually W6UMC's room that took the brunt of the invasion. During that session, we all got to check in with the official convention two-meter station KY6SD. I managed to tune my TR-22C up to a full 1000-milliwatt output so we could work clear across the parking lot into the QTH of KY6SD. That "KY" prefix used to be assigned to U.S. hams in Okinawa, but since we gave that island back to its former owners, KY is no longer used.

Late on Saturday afternoon, the ARRL Open Forum was held. This was led by Director Griggs, supported by President Dannals, Lew McCoy W1ICP and Ellen White W1YL of ARRL. John very graciously introduced Ellen as "the only \$ 25 call girl at headquarters". May we remind you that two-letter calls cost \$ 25, just in case anyone was wondering.

President Dannals spoke briefly, but succinctly about the decrease in the ranks of amateur radio. He suggested that if each of us brings a new ham into the hobby, we could double our population. He backs the idea of the new communicator type of license.

Questions and comments were solicited from the floor and our League officials did a good job in responding to them. Questions concerning WESCARS interference, ARRL publications, and League policies were among the subjects reviewed.

Convention Report (Cont'd)

We ran into Wally Linstruth, WA6JPR during our wanderings around the Convention Center. So far, the TRW/ARC was showing good attendance. By the way, the Convention Center is a beautiful facility, an ideal place for a gathering of several thousand people. It is located in the Mission Valley area, close to hotels, entertainment and shopping centers. The YL's and XYL's had plenty of diversion to add to their fun.

Saturday night, the Convention Banquet took place. The dining facilities were excellent and the prime-rib dinner was delicious. They told us that nearly 1100 people partook of the dinner and program.

After the usual recognition of the hard-working convention committee personnell, the speaker of the evening was introduced. Armond Noble, assistant editor of Worldradio News, held his audience enthralled with a message that was inspirational and up-lifting. In a sense, it was a sermon on what amateur radio is really all about, and what it really could be in terms of people-to-people communication. He pointed out, that we hams, with all our sophisticated electronics, beam antennas and operating skills really don't communicate! Is it really communications to say "Hi there old man, the handle here is Joe, we are running a full KW into a pair of 240Z's, with a three-element quad 89 feet up, you are 5/9 here in Cucamonga and please QSL via the bureau, 73".....

.....or, wouldn't it really be communications to find out who he really is, and what does he think, and what is his philosophy, and what is his outlook on life. And isn't it communications to tell him who you really are? How about learning a few words of another language, so that you can greet that DX ham with a few words of his own tongue. Does it all have to be in English?

Armond suggests that we hams are perhaps living in the past. We are still dazzled by fact that "wireless works". Lets move on from that point and use our skills and equipment to really communicate on a people-to-people basis.

Armond received a standing ovation for his talk. That's how he came across. Judy told me later, that if anything could motivate her to become a ham, Armonds message would do it!

The wrap-up of the Banquet was the traditional door prize drawings. As we mentioned earlier, our door prize tickets didn't do us any good, but Ernie Brelsford, K6TZ, our associate member from Santa Barbara found that he had a real winner! He carried home the second prize, a Robot Slow-Scan TV Camera complete with lens and monitor. Nice going Ernie, you may be the first of our membership to go SSTV!

The Sunday morning activities included breakfasts by several groups-QCWA, WESCARS, DX Clubs and a special one for the ladies. We missed the session on girl-watching, but will try to make up for that another time.

Convention Report (Cont'd)

We did have a short eye-ball QSO with "Mert" Moser, W6HS and told him we were all looking forward to his program about Tom Christian, VR6TC and the other descendants of the "Bounty" and their life on Pitcairn Island, at the club Hamfeast on November 9th.

Well, San Diego '74 was great. We had a good time, met a lot of fine people and carried away some positive ideas about making amateur radio more meaningful. We'll be looking forward to the '75 convention in Ventura and hope that many of our fellow club members can be there too.

Pioneer Tells 1915 Start

Retired Major General Loren G. Windom-W8GZ, is a pioneer on amateur bands and dates back to 1915, when he first became interested in the art of wireless after looking through a Sears-Roebuck catalogue.

He then obtained a kit that enabled him to contact a fellow amateur living a few blocks away.

His amateur call at the time was "LW," his initials, and he used that call until the start of WW-I when all amateurs were required to cease operation.

After the war Loren went back on the air using the call LW, then 8AOK, 8ZO and 8ZG until he received his present call of W8GZ.

In 1919 he started using a 1/4 kilowatt spark transmitter followed by a full kilowatt. When spark transmitters were outlawed, he went on the air using a UV-201 vacuum tube for making contact by code.

As an amateur, W8GZ has written many articles for the American Radio Relay League's publications "QST" and the "ARRL Hand Book." Today, we often hear some amateur state that he or she is using a "Windom" antenna which he had described in the September, 1929, issue of QST. Another article was published in the July, 1925, issue. In the May, 1964, issue is another article by Loren on antenna indicators that is worth reviewing.

Active in League affairs for many years, he served as director for the old Central Division during the period 1931 to 1935.

Joining the National Guard as a private in 1924, he retired as major general with a mili-

tary record that included serving in WW-II with the Army G-3 section, 37th Infantry Div. and as commander of the 145th Infantry Regiment. He holds the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star with Oak Leaf clusters, Legion of Merit with two Oak Leaf clusters, Bronze Star with two Oak Leaf clusters, and a Purple Heart with three Oak Leaf clusters.

A graduate of the College of Law, Ohio State University, in 1929 with a JD degree, he was appointed to the U.S. Attorney General's office, U.S. Dept of Justice, in 1936 where he served until 1959, except for the period when he was called to active duty with the Army.

He was made adjutant general of the Ohio State Guard in 1963 and served until his re-

tirement in 1968. He held the office of regional attorney, Interstate Commerce Commission also from 1963 until 1968. Loren is like the fellow who made the statement after retirement from a number of jobs, that he was looking for one with a future.

A member of the Old Old Timers' Club, known as the Who's Who in Amateur Radio, he is also a member of the Quarter Century Wireless Association with the 50-year endorsement. In two years, he will receive the 60 year seals for both his OOTC and QCWA certificates.

W8GZ is a firm believer that amateur radio is an asset in time of emergency. From 1924 until the start of WW-II Loren served as net control for the Army Amateur Radio Service, 5th Corps, area. AARS is the forerunner of Army MARS.

Station W8GZ was quite active during the tornado-season early this year when the town of Xenia was practically destroyed and other cities in the Dayton area were badly hit.

Pioneer Craft Accelerating as It Nears Jupiter

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)

—The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) gives this progress report on Pioneer 2, the spacecraft headed for Jupiter and Saturn: 22,000 m.p.h. and accelerating.

NASA spokesmen predict the unmanned craft will make its closest approach to Jupiter on Dec. 2 and arrive at Saturn in September, 1979.

The acceleration results from Jupiter's gravitational tug. The 570-pound craft will be moving at 106,000 m.p.h. on Dec. 2.

Both at Jupiter and at Saturn, the craft is to radio back to the earth photographs of the planets.

TRW's Pioneer Spacecraft will be doing its flyby of Jupiter on December 2nd, of this year. If you don't have your very own set of QSL's with the Pioneer (see sample attached), it is still not too late to fill out the application on page 11 of this issue of the CrossTalk.
