Equipment setup will begin at 0700 Saturday morning with 24 hours of continuous operating time to start sharply at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday. Electrical power will be cut promptly 24 hours after the start at 11:00 a.m. Sunday morning. Sunday lunch will be provided during the tear down and site clean up activities.

Food and meals are being coordinated by Lou Cartier and Alice Dews. Meals and beverages will be provided for all active participants.

If you are planning to spend the night bring your own sleeping facilities.

Also bring extra chairs for the shelters which will be provided by Gary Kamatsu.

It is very important that each participant follow the parking instructions shown on the site map. Only those team captains and helpers who are bringing equipment and supplies should use the entrance gate on Flaming Arrow Drive. All others use only the entrance and parking lot on Longhill Drive. This is very important from a safety viewpoint.

On the subject of parking make sure your vehicles are secured to avoid potential rig rip-offs like the one that occurred at last years Field Day location. LOCK YOUR CARS AND USE YOUR ALARMS!

Since we are again the guests of the Palos Verdes Peninsula School District please pay particular attention to maintaining a neat and clean location and leave your area as neat or better than when we arrived.

The club will be operating with our own call W6TRW/6. As of now the call of the Novice station is not known however we are planning on a Novice setup.

FCC regs require that each operator have in their possession your original license so make sure you bring it along.

The official ARRL Field Day rules are printed in May 1977 QST and will not be repeated here.

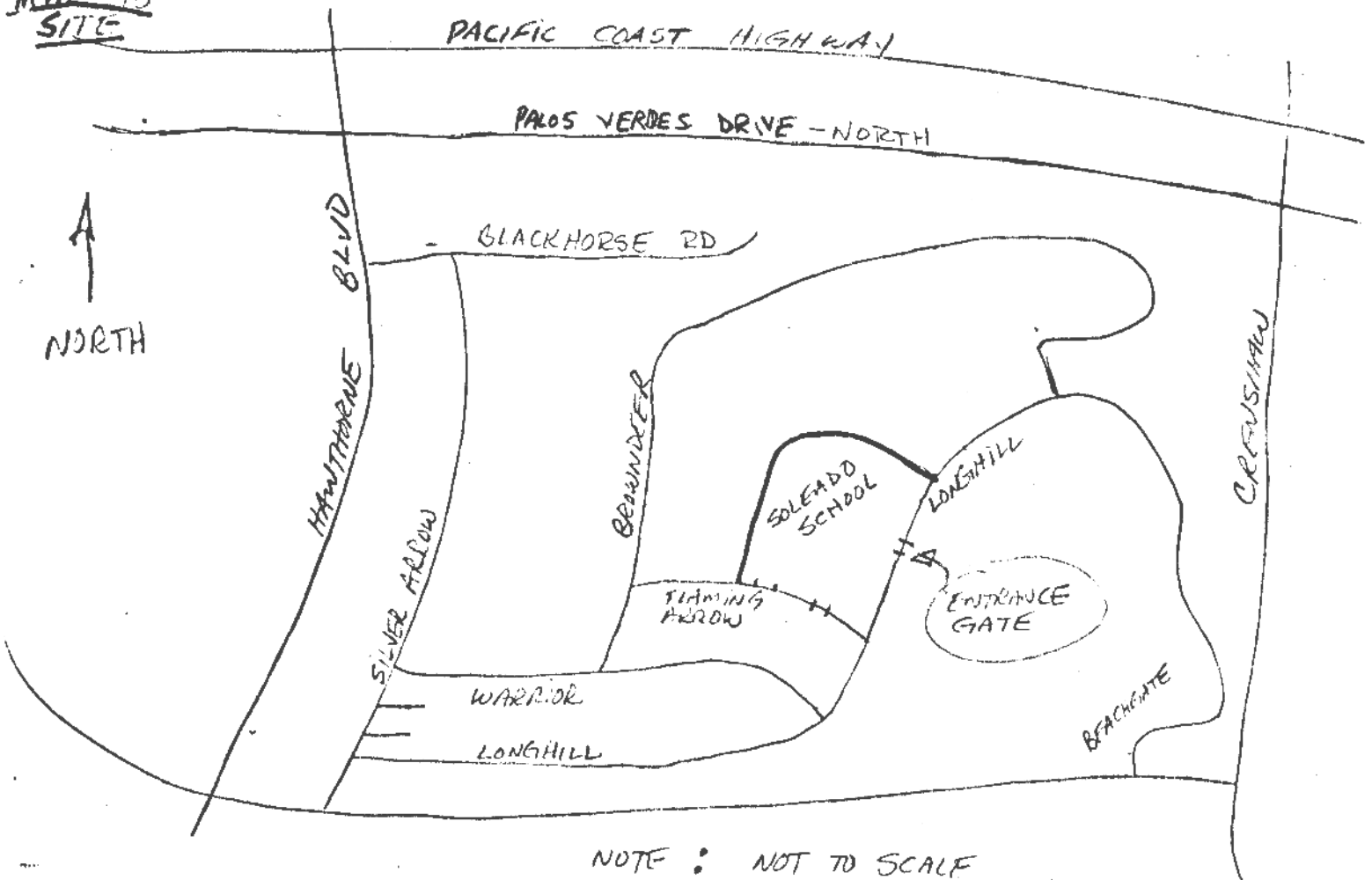
All contacts shall be recorded on the supplied log sheets. Only log the time of each operator's start and stop time. It is no longer necessary to record the time of each contact although space is provided on the log sheet if you desire to do so. As in previous years, log sheets will be collected at the end of each operating hour. It is essential that each operator record his in and out time so that we have a record of who was operating a particular station at any particular time.

Since the ARRL requires the submittal of all check sheets (dupe sheets) it is very important that the logger or operator enter the call of each contact on the supplied check sheet. The logs are not to be submitted to the ARRL except by special request.

We will be operating in Class 6A (6 simultaneous stations, emergency power) and since we have 6 stations they will remain in operation at all times so there will be no operating time conflicts or band plan required.

TRW ANTENNA PARTY

The Building 65 beam rotor has been reinstalled and its position indicator indicates - correctly! A work party consisting of Bill Cowart (prospective ham), Bill Dews (K6AWO), Phil Presser (WB6MXE), Burnie Ramming and Chip Martin (more about them later), and Fred Snively (WB6AWG) accomplished this on June 4th.

The rotor was up and in place under the beam 55 minutes after the first man went up the tower, thanks to Bill Dews' experience and careful advanced planning. (If the Tower Top Twins, Chip and Fred, had known this was a run for the record, they could have shortened the time.) The 75 meter dipole was also rehung.

The real work was just beginning, however, and Bill Dews and Fred spent the next four hours and a combined total of six trips up the mast locating the break in the position indicator wire and running a 75 foot(!) jumper. A handheld 2 meter transceiver loaned by Stan Johnson, W6EEK, provided communications from the top of the tower to the shack-invaluable during the isolation exercise.

Fred Snively organized the work party so the club station would be available to communicate with Burnie and Chip who are leaving June 18 for a 15 month cruise thru the South Pacific aboard Burnie's 55 foot sailboat.

TRW ARC has won its Field Day class in '71, '73, '75 and '76. TRW ARC has an active 2 meter net, at 147.510 MHz (Simplex) nominally at 10 am. (local time) Saturdays; this net is usually buzzing. TRW ARC has its own station, W6TRW with a Swan 500C, an IC230, a Heath novice rig and a home brew 2 meter SSB rig. TRW ARC belongs to AMSAT and built OSCAR IV. TRW ARC conducts ham classes; in 1976 we graduated 21 novices and 9 generals. I hope the statistics haven't scared you off, but the point is that TRW ARC is a large active club. Our news bulletin gets wide circulation.

What is CROSSTALK?

CROSSTALK is the TRW ARC news bulletin, it is circulated to all members (not limited to TRW employees) and to 40 other groups (such as Santa Barbara ARC, LAACARC, etc.).
