NEWS OF INTEREST.....

Details emerging from the Soviet Union indicate the USSR is planning to launch a communications relay spacecraft for amateur radio operators. The Soviet spacecraft would complement two U.S. Radio Amateur Satellite Corp. Oscar spacecraft currently functioning in orbit. The Soviets have done little to discourage Russian amateurs from communication with U.S. amateurs. About 50 Soviet amateur stations have used the U.S. Oscar spacecraft, and a much higher number of stations in Soviet Bloc countries have used the spacecraft.

The Personal Communications Foundation will hold a seminar in "personal Communications and the Law" on September 26, 1977, at 8 o'clock pm, at the DWP Auditorium located at 111 N. Hope Street, Los Angeles, California. The seminar will be aired live over a two meter amateur radio repeater located on Mt. Lee, WR6ABN. The public is invited to attend the seminar at the auditorium and all hams are invited to listen in on 147.84/.24. Admission at the auditorium is free.

The speakers are all attorneys and members of the Board of Trustees of the Personal Communications Foundation, a non-profit, tax exempt corporation organized to serve as a clearinghouse for legal research relating to personal communications legal problems.

The seminar will be moderated by Kenneth Widelitz, WA6PPZ, president of the PCF. Jon Gallo, WA6PTM, will speak on "Legal Considerations in Erecting and Antenna." Carl Markov, K6RLP, will cover "RFI/TVI and the Law of Nuisance." Fred Lawson, K6JAN, will talk on "Litigating Personal Communications Cases." There will be a short on the air question and answer period followed by off the air questions from persons in the auditorium.

The PCF is a non-profit, tax-expt foundation organized expressly to serve as a central clearinghouse of information and research in the area of personal communications law. The PCF is the only organization of its kind because personal communications law is not yet formally recognized as a legal specialization. This is true although statistics indicate that in 1976 alone there were 7,000 legal matters pending involving all aspects of personal communications.

The cost lf litigating such a specialized lawsuit can be in excess of \$10,000. Approximately 40% of that cost represents time devoted to research. An attorney will access to the PCF's specialized personal communications library of briefs, cases and in-depth studies can eliminate much of that research time and consequently reduce litigation costs by thousands of dollars. Further, because most attorneys are not familiar with the nuances of personal communications law, an attorney using PCF materials can better represent his client. For example, the PCF has spent in excess of \$2,000 funding a study on the issue of Federal pre-emption of the personal communications fieldby the Communications Act of 1934. This study was conducted by a constitutional law expert who is also an engineer. The resulting legal memoranda has already been incorporated into a brief before the California Court of Appeals.

The PCF cannot run on the energies of its Trustees alone. In order to continue to build its library and fund additional studies in areas where existing case law is in conflict or in those areas which have not been adequately briefed to date, substantial funding is necessary. PCF estimates it needs \$250,000 in its first two years to be fully effective.

Thus far the PCF has gotten off the ground thanks to significant contributions by the Amateur Radio Relay League, Wilson Electronics and Yaesu.

As the PCF is a membership corporation, much of the funding is expected to come from membership contributions. With over 300,000 amateur radio operators and 14,000,000 CBers in the U.S., membership contributions should be substantial. Four classes of membership have been established. These are known as associate membership, for a yearly contribution of \$10.00, full membership for a yearly contribution of \$100.00 and life sustaining membership for a single contribution of \$250.00 or more. All members except associate members are eligible to vote for Trustees.

Contributions to the PCF are tax deductible.

The PCF office has recently been relocated to 10960 Wilshire Blvd., Suite 1504, Los Angeles, California, 90024.

This area of law greatly affects all hams. It has been suggested that we, as an active club, send a donation. This will help the foundation and keep us aware of what is currently happening in the field of personal communications.

Al Lee, who recently returned from Australia, will have some slides from his trip to show at our next meeting. It included a trip to ARRL. We hope those pictures will be ready in time. As most of you know he was a mainstay in our organization and is well known for his presentations. You wont want to miss this one.
