THERE'S A NEW STAR IN THE HEAVENS

UoSAT-Oscar 9 was launched from Vandenberg AFB in early October, and it carries some impressive gear. One of the best is an Earth-pointing solid state camera designed to provide land and sea image data for transmission to simple and inexpensive ground stations. Other goodies onboard are beacons at 7, 14, 21, and 28 MHz to provide data on ionospheric paths and electron densities; a magnetometer to study the Earth's magnetic field; radiation detectors and counters to study solar activity in real time; and microwave beacons to study SHF propagation. It also features some telemetry in synthesized speech, as well as in ASCII, Baudot, and morse code.

As part of our emerging Oscar station, TRW/ARC has purchased the ARRL's Oscarlocator package, which provides station requirements and operating tips, frequency charts, launch history, and other goodies. For more information, contact club president Gary Komatsu.

One of the special features of the October swap meet was the club auction, and thanks to Bill Dews, I was not only a first-time visitor to the event, but was shanghied into serving as the auctioneer. Many people helped to make the event profitable for the club: Fred Valentine, Ed Wheeler, Bob Hume, Charley Speelman, Gary Komatsu, Dale Mooney (assitant to the auctioneer), Vic Musil, Phil Wheeler, and Bill Dews. The least pleasant part of the job began at 7:15 AM, but with so many involved, the loading was finished in about 40 minutes. Now that everything is over, I'd like to make some suggestions. This even is important to the club both for publicity and revenue. Publicity is easily obtained over the air. The revenue aspect could use more attention. With the auction, the biggest problem is that neither the auctioneer nor the prospective buyers new how well an item worked or how much it was really worth. As a result, for example, we ended up selling oscilloscopes for less than \$10. Since most of the items are donations, we need some volunteers to sort through the items and evaluate them periodically, before the next auction. (Or, perhaps, the donors could do this--ed.)

The club also needs a better PA system, as well as a good sign, prominently posted, explaining who is conducting the auction and why.

So much for the comments--I would like to thank all those who helped and all those who attended the auction.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

There's a report out of Harvard Medical School that electricity is being used to heal broken bones that haven't healed for a long time on their own. There are three methods used, two of which use surgically implanted electrodes. In the third method, current is induced in the bone by pulsing electromagnetic fields generated by coils on the outside of a plaster cast. Your editor feels it's still a good idea to keep one hand in your pocket while working on your gear--even if you do have a broken bone.
