General Meeting, 28 June 1983

Twenty-eight people attended. President Bill Rodner welcomed new members and guests and thanked those who participated in Field Day activities. Prior meeting minutes were approved as printed in the June <u>Crosstalk</u>. The club will participate in the TRW Systems Employees' Association Family A'Fair on 17 September.

Vice President Fred Garrett, standing in for Treasurer Connie Gilmore, reported the treasury to be in excellent condition. The club is planning to buy antennas for the club station and is looking for portable towers for future Field Days.

Jim Richardson (K6PDR) gave a short talk on a dual-tone multifrequency decoder. Jim provided a copy of the schematic, printed elsewhere in this issue.

Chris Wachs (WA2KDL) reported on the recent AMSAT launch. The western U.S. AMSAT Net meets at 8pm on 3850 kHz LSB.

Activities Manager Gary Komatsu reviewed the club's Field Day participation in class 6A. He will tabulate the results and send them in to the ARRL. He estimated that we earned 2000 more points this year over last. Gary expressed special thanks to the wives who prepared the delicious food during the event. Bill Schrecengost (KE6LB) showed his videotape of the Field Day activities.

The door prizes were two each multitesters, socket wrench sets, and clock pens.

Executive Board Meeting, 12 July 1983

Attending were Bill Daley, Bill Dews, Dave Gilmore, Jim Hill, Bill Ivey, Gary Komatsu, Walt Pearson, Jim Richardson, and Bill Rodner.

President Bill Rodner called the meeting to order and announced the Swapmeet Manager assignments for 30 July to be Mike Aust (WB6DJI) and Jim Richardson (K6PDR). Meeting minutes were approved as printed in the June Crosstalk.

Activities Manager Gary Komatsu plans to visit a tower manufacturer and expects to acquire two portable antenna towers for the club. Club membership in TASMA is being renewed. Gary is working on the club satellite communications system, as time permits. The club 2M transceiver PL needs repair. Action was postponed on ordering a new HF antenna and rotor until data on various alternatives is available.

LAACARC Delegate Bill Daley reported that hams are getting media publicity on TV channels 2, 7, and II. He reviewed the ARRL petition to the FCC to preclude cable TV from operating on amateur radio frequencies. The LAACARC has signed a cooperative agreement with ARES and has plans to operate ham communications during the Olympics. Bill also circulated applications for the 1983 ARRL Southwestern Division convention, September 2-4, in Anaheim.

Emergency Coordinator DaveGilmore reported that Jim Richardson has volunteered to refurbish the club handitalkies and maintain them with batteries charged. Jim was thanked for his help in this very necessary function.

Membership Chairman Bill Dews reported that there was one new associate member last month, bringing the total number of members to 146.

SEA Council Representative Bill Ivey stated that the semiannual report to SEA, due by 8 September, is in work. The TRW ARC is starting plans for activities at the Family A'Fair, set for 17 September.

Acting Swapmeet chairman Jim Hill reported that hot dogs have been added to the concession menu. Discussion of seller limitations and problems of expansion followed.

Jim Richardson made comments regarding objectives toward the betterment of the club and development of personal capabilities of members.






FIELD DAY 83 — MONDAY AM QUARTERBACKING — Bill Schrecengost (KE6LB)

Field Day 1983 is now history, and while it is fresh in my mind, I must record the things we didn't do right and the things we must do to correct these shortcomings next year.

First, we must always have backup power sources that are capable of powering all of our stations. We did have two portable generators, which we quickly got on line when the big generator quit in the middle of Saturday afternoon—but they didn't have the capabity to supply all six stations.


Second, only two of the six stations were properly manned, 15 and 20 meter SSB. The remaining four bands only had one scheduled operator each.

Third, every station should have a backup antenna (such as a long wire, dipole inverted V or vertical) that can quickly be used if the primary antenna isn't working. The 20 CW station had antenna problems and never got going, even though the band was really hot. This, and the undermanned 15 CW station, burt us with respect to ARRL contest ranking.

In summary, I suggest we plan for next year to have adequate backup generators, adequately manned stations, and--for sure--backup antennas. The Friendship Park site was excellent, and we should commit it for 1984. The food service, provided by TRW ARC XYLs, was superb, no improvement needed there. In spite of the few problems we encountered, all participants had fun, and we demonstrated, for the most part, our emergency communications preparedness. One last comment: The true spirit of emergency communication preparedness is to arrive at

the Field Day site Saturday morning, set up quickly, and start operating at the prescribed time. This is what we would have to do if a real emergency occured. We should consider doing this next year.
