GENERAL MEETING 24 APRIL 1984 John Keller, NGJLS

Twenty two members attended. President Walt Pearson called the meeting to order. Secretary John Keller accepted the 27 Mar 1984 General Meeting minutes as printed in the Crosstalk. Treasurer Paul Herbert gave a quick rundown on the budget agreed upon at the last Executive Board Meeting and stated that the treasury is in good shape and right on budget predictions. Vice-President Chris Wachs stated that the Hughes ARC auction had been postponed. Original date had been after the April TRW/ARC Swapmeet. New date is after the May Swapmeet (Sat. 26 May). The ARRL video tape "Amateur Radio's Newest Frontier" was shown. The tape covers the activities of the flight of STS-9 and Owen Garriott, W5LFL. It is a excellent tape showing some of the efforts before the flight, contacts made during the flight, and some of the Amateur Radio activities connected with the flight but not directly related to communicating with Owen. the latecomers bought additional door prize tickets, Paul Herbert related the activities of the previous weekend when the 2 Meter repeater antenna was replaced. The new antenna seems to be performing very well with better coverage to all points of the compass. No speaker was announced for the next meeting as arrangements were still being made.

Executive Board Meeting 8 May 1984 John Keller, NGJLS

Attending were Bill Daley, Bill Dews, Paul Herbert, Bob Hume, Bill Ivey, John Keller, Gary Komatsu, Walt Pearson, Don Resor Jr., Jim Richardson, Chris Wachs, and Paul Wisiolek.

President Walt Pearson called the meeting to order. Walt expressed thanks to Gary Komatsu for a great club picnic. All who attended had a great time. Walt also expressed thanks to all Executive Board and Staff members for doing a great and sometimes superlative job. All efforts are appreciated.

Vice-President Chris Wachs requested a "no business" meeting for the next General Meeting of the TRW/ARC. The reason for this request is that the next speaker will be Harold Price, AK6K, who will speak on and demonstrate a packet radio system. Mr. Price is very active in packet radio as both a user and designer, being very active in the local packet community, having used

Oscar 10 for some packet communications and is Project Manager for the AMSAT Packet Radio Satellite. Mr. Price's presentation takes almost a full hour so the request for a "no business" meeting was approved. General Meeting is Tuesday, May 28, Noon (SHARP!) in R4/1041. Chris suggested a GASFET preamp for the club 2 Meter repeater and Gary Komatsu said that he has a line on one.

Secretary John Keller passed out a draft of a new information sheet to be used to attract new members into the club. ARRL sponsored insurance to protect the club from lawsuits was rejected as all of that coverage is provided by SEA. One more postcard was received from clubs that had not been heard from with an exchange of newsletters.

Treasurer and QSL Card Organizer Herbert stated that the budget has been modified slightly to account for the net loss to the club that the door prizes present. Paul pointed out that this is not a large loss and it is being made up for by a larger than expected income from the Swapmeet. Paul reported that the obtaining of new QSL Cards has taken a giant leap foward as the TRW Vice-President of Communications has approved the club'. request for new cards and all the info is in the Graphics department for design. Paul was wondering if the wording of the QSL printed info should be changed as there are new forms of communication which should be accounted for. John Keller was given the task of writing the ARRL to find out if there are any guidelines in this regard. It is the policy of the club not to publish details of the club treasury. If any club members want details of our income and expenditures you may find these out at a club meeting or contact the Treasurer. board and staff members phone numbers can be found on the last page of the Crosstalk.

Activities Chairman Gary Komatsu stated that he has purchased T-Shirts for Field Day and has also received the antenna masts that were ordered. Gary also purchased a bull-horn for use by the Swapmeet Managers. Gary stated that we are also in need of a 2 Meter Captain for Field Day. The club has a brand spankin' new ICOM 271A for use that day so if anyone is interested please give Gary a call!!

Trustee Bob Hume showed off the new ICOM 271A tranceiver and stated the instruction book was like learning to use a personal computer! Copies of the manual will be made and be put in the library of the club

station for checkout. With the increased activity on 40 Meters to K6AWS in Idaho, Bob suggested that a 40-80 Meter dipole be urchased and installed as an Inverted-V so that the club station can be used by those interested. Also needed is a plug mold with a switch and circuit breaker so that many individual pieces of equipment can be controlled at one time, i.e., the Oscar 10 setup. Funds were approved for these purchases.

LAACARC Delegate Bill Daley stated that the QSL bureau handled 57,000 cards. Radio Operators were being solicited to help with communications for a 200 to 400 mile bicycle race between Thousand Oaks Refugio Beach. Problem is the race is being held Field Day! If you want to help and won't be at Field Day call Bill or John Keller. Amateurs are being actively recruited for the Olympics. There are many ways to help - see the March Crosstalk for details of how you can get involved.

Walt reported that contact has been made between the TRW/ARC Emergency Communications Group Coordinator Dave Gilmore and the TRW Security Emergency Coordinator. Further detailed meetings are to be held around the nd of May.

membership Chairman Bill Dews quickly reported that the club presently has 134 members. This is down slightly from last year.

SEA Council Representative Bill Ivey clarified the SEA requirements concerning all correspondence from our club to other clubs. John Keller volunteered to create a letterhead to conform to these requirements and submit it for approval.

Assistant Swapmeet Manager Don Resor Jr. stated that there were 260 sellers at the last Swapmeet. The computer list of regular sellers is working well and helping to speed the processing of sellers as they arrive. There has been an increase in buyers parking illegally in areas where the curbs are painted red. All buyers are put on warning that the City of Manhattan Beach Police Department CAN AND WILL ticket vehicles that are illegally parked! Please park in designated parking slots only and walk just a little further.

Walt closed the meeting with a suggestion to Staff Officers that they follow Jim awilliams lead and obtain someone to work with them as an assistant.

AN EMERGENCY AUTOPATCH PRIMER E. J. Schwartzman, WB4IOL

Let's face it: Nobody is ever fully prepared to make an emergency call, and it's normal to stumble a bit. Since we cannot practice on the air the way we do for traffic handling or for communication backup service, the best we can do is to refresh our memory of the steps to take and the information needed, and hope for the best.

Step 1: Stay calm, which is not very easy if you've just seen a sports car climb under a semi-tractor truck to get out of the sun. Try to stay cool, anyway; you can't help anyone in a panic.

Step 2: Stop and THINK. Move to a position where you are not in danger and take stock of the situation. You should be able to get the information needed for the authorities in 30 seconds or less. Try it some time when there is no emergency; it will be good practice.

Step 3: Call for help. If you have called 911, your call was probably "screened" by a police agency, such as the county sheriff. Give them a brief description (see below) of the incident and the location so they can transfer your call to the proper agency. Give this agency all the details they need, and follow whatever instructions they give. Do not get involved in any emergency unless you know thoroughly what you are doing. You could get into serious trouble and then need help yourself.

Information to be given in an emergency.

- 1) What is the nature of the incident? (i.e., car accident, crime, fire, stalled vehicle, etc.)
- 2) Is there immediate danger to life and property? Are there injuries, leaking gas, downed power lines?
 - 3) Is it happening right now?
- 4) Where is/was the incident? Be as exact with location description(s) as possible: what road, direction of travel, distance and direction from highway exit or mile marker, any landmarks.
- 5) Number and descriptions of person(s)/vehicle(s) involved. Describe the person(s) involved: sex, age, race, height, weight, etc. Describe the vehicle(s): make and model of the vehicle(s), license number, any noticeable characteristics such as dents, body rot or other damage.

While this seems a great deal of information to get in a very short time, remember that some situations will need much more than what and where the incident is. The

investigating officers can get the rest of the details at the scene.

The average emergency call should take no more than 30 seconds from the time the autopatch is accessed until it is terminated. Adding 30 seconds that it should take to get yourself and your information organized brings the total time invested to one minute.

Got a minute? Do it right and make it count!

ARRL Insurance

Have you checked your insurance lately? Does your homeowners policy cover your radio equipment? Have you inventoried your "har shack" lately to see how many bars of go. you have hidden in there? The ARRL offers insurance to amateur radio operators who are members of the ARRL, and there a some very interesting aspects. The cost of the policy is \$1 per \$100 of replacement cost value, with a minimum of \$10 and a \$5 administrative fee. The deductible is only \$50 unless the loss is due to lightning or fire and then it is only \$25. The only items not covered are towers, antennas and rotors. All radio equipment is covered - - both fixed and mobile. You must insure all of your equipment - you cannot insure just part of it. Any new equipment that you buy after the policy is in effect will also be covered as long as it's value is less than \$1000. The TRW/ARC uses this insurance as we are an affiliated ARRL Club. You may have a tough time finding all of it, but the TRW/ARC has almost \$7000 worth of equipment - every bit of it insured by the ARRL policy. If you like more information write would phone):


