Prizes were donated by Mel Erb, K6GWC. Some of the new QSL cards were on display with W6TRW, N6JLS And N6DMV callsign stickers applied. ATTENTION -

First and Second Class Radiotelephone Licensees

The present First and Second Class Radiotelephone licenses will not be renewed by the FCC when they expire! However, this year only, a Lifetime License may be obtained FREE by current license holders by sending a self-addressed, stamped envelope to your local FCC office, with your license number and "Lifetime License" written on the outside. If you have an endorsement, such as for ship radar, a photocopy of your license must accompany your request. There will be NO formal FCC notice of this offer. This information was obtained verbally from an FCC representative at the 6 March 1985 meeting of the Southern California Marine Radio Council and is published for the benefit of the Amateur Radio Community by the TRW Amateur Radio Club.

Attending were Jim Cox, Bill Daley, Bill Dews, Paul Herbert, Bob Hume, Dale Jensen, John Keller, Gary Komatsu, Paul Lukas, Joe O'Brien, Jack Orr, Walt Pearson, Don Resor III, Jim Wike and Paul Wisiolek. The meeting was called to order at 1731 local time by Walt Pearson, President. Bill Daley, K6BO, LAACARC Representative gave an accounting of the LAACARC as of the March 5, 1985 meeting. The LAACARC has suggested that each club be prepared to give a 5 minute talk on different facets of Amateur Radio at the upcoming HamCon. He also pointed out the necessity for preparedness in case of an earthquake. Bill brought with him a stack of HamCon flyers. Letters from W1JCK and Jay Holladay were handed over to Walt along with a copy of the LAACARC Delegate Handbook, listing info on license examinations, emergency frequencies, etc. Joe O'Brien reported that the next speaker for the General Club meeting (Tuesday, March 26, Noon, R4/1041) will be "Smitty" Smith of Hughes who will talk about the Volunteer Examiner program. Paul Herbert, K6GCR, gave the financial report for the Club. Paul stated that the new tower for the Club station is in the budget if the cost remains less than \$1000.00. Jim Wike, W6GPE, reported that 16 people had signed up for the March 15 St. Patrick's Day celebration. The Club has allocated \$50 to cover the pizza discounts and the refreshments. Gary Komatsu, K6HPD, expressed his concern about obtaining power cables for the coming Field Day. We need three 100ft extension cords (#10 or #12 conductors) to supply power to the radios. Past experience shows that borrowed cables invite trouble. The estimated cost for the cables is \$300.00. No decision was made at this time for cable purchase. Bob Hume, K6GB, reported on the Club antenna situation. The KT34XA has checked out OK, an antenna party is scheduled for Saturday which will work on the 40M Quad antenna. Inspection by an engineer of the roof structure raised objection regarding putting up the 47 foot tower on the roof and we only need to wait for an official OK. A steel base plate is needed, cost \$60.00. New guy wires will also be installed. A discussion followed on the Field Day preparations. Budget of \$250 is allocated for Field Day. Gary reported that HamCon reservations are coming in fast, with over 200 already received. He will contact radio manufacturers concerning door prizes. Walt reported that he will fill in as Emergency Communications Coordinator since Dave Gilmore has passed away. Walt also stated that he is looking for someone to fill that Staff position in the Club. Bill Dews, K6AWO, reported that the Club has 131 paid up members (145 on roster). Bill requested money to purchase a battery pack for one of the 4 Icom HT's that seems to have a bad cell. John Keller, N6JLS, has revised the Club Constitution and By-Laws (minor changes). Bill Dews voiced his concern of training new Club Officers before the present ones vacate their seat. Don Resor III, N6KAW, reported that too many commercial sellers show up at the Swapmeet. Plans are in the making to prevent such dealers from coming to our Swapmeet - including turning them away at the gates. Jim Cox, K7JAJ, reported that the W6NWP repeater repair is almost finished, with the courtesy tone the only feature to add. He agreed to coordinate a Repeater Committee meeting in the near future. Gary stated that the 450 MHz remote base system is functional and only awaiting an antenna installation in Bldg 65 to make it operational. The meeting was adjourned at 1919 local time.

YOUR HELP IS NEEDED

On January 3, Senator Barry Goldwater, K7UGA, introduced two resolutions which would request the FCC to declare limited Federal preemption over antennas. One resolution deals with home satellite dishes, and the other (Senate Resolution 36), if adopted, will declare the sense of the U.S. Senate that the FCC should affirm that state and local regulations must not unreasonably restrict communications from Amateur Radio stations. Passage of this resolution would send a clear message to the FCC that favorable action on PRB-1 (the ARRL's request for Federal preemption of restrictive local antenna ordinances) would be looked upon with favor by the U.S. Senate.

In order to achieve passage of Senate Resolution 36, your help is needed. Please take the time to contact both of our California Senators, Pete Wilson and Alan Cranston, and urge a YES vote on Senate Resolution 36. A short letter in your own words, or even a QSL card with a note requesting passage will help. The most effective letters will be those giving details of an Amateur's struggle with local authorities before an antenna could be put up and those where an Amateur was prevented from putting up any effective antenna. You should make it clear in your letter that Amateur's recognize the right of local authorities to regulate the safety of structures and that they recognize special situations, such as historic districts, where Amateur Radio antennas may be restricted.

Even if you have time for only a brief note, please do it now! Passage of this resolution, and positive FCC action on PRB-1, could determine the outcome of three vital antenna cases now pending in different districts of the U.S. Court of Appeals.

Turkey's First Amateur

An item of great interest to all DX'ers was recently received by Worldradio. Dr. Unal Akbal, TA1A (ex TA1UA) received his license and call sign from the Ministry of Transport and Telecommunications of 30 January 1985. Dr. Akbal says he is the first licensed radio amateur of Turkey. TA1A's operation schedule is as follows: 14.025 +10 kHz ar 21.025 + 10 kHz (CW) and 14.195 +10 kHz a 21.250 +10kHz (SSB). He'll be on the air Saturdays and Sundays. No times were given. Perhaps this is an indication that Amateur Radio is becoming legal in Turkey.
