The Space Park TRW Family Day and Open House will be held

Now about our Open House on the 28th of September. The last Family Day and Picnic combination was a mixed success as the vertical low band antenna was a little balky and the computer screens had a tendancy to wash out in the bright sunlight. So we learned our lesson last

year and this year should be better. Since a lot of this came up at the last minute and we don't have any volunteers ready to jump into the fray, I, John Keller, will volunteer to organize this thing until somebody agrees to take it from me. Here is what I think we need and should show:

- A low band station with a reasonably good antenna. I'm thinking either a Field Day Quad or the 20 M beam or Ollie's Folly on 40 M or a combination of the above. Really need an external speaker for audio.
- 2) A packet radio setup. Last year we linked up with the Computer Club, this year I don't think that will be necessary as LA is a hotbed of Packet activity.
- 3) An Oscar station setup that does not need to operate, we can always say that the satellite is out of view, but if it does that's great. I think the beam antennas will be a good drawing point.
- 4) We need brochures from the ARRL and the TRW/ARC about Amateur Radio. The ARRL ones we can get as they will be there for the Swapmeet and we already have something for the TRW/ARC.
- 5) We need signs. Big BIG signs. Easy to read. Attention getters! Can you or your family work on something if we gave you what we want on it???
- 6) We need <u>PEOPLE</u>. Everyone wants to operate and everyone should get a chance but we also need people to answer questions, pass out information, etc.

Ever since I built this handy table for our novice school - actually I built three - people are after the plans. And it couldn't be simpler. The illustration below is approximately to scale. It is made from one 4-x-8-foot plywood sheet, with no waste. Although you can use particle board, I would not recommend it, as it will not stand up to a lot of setting up and taking down.

Five-eighths thick, sanded on one side, is the ideal material. Be sure to sand all edges smooth to avoid splinters in the fingers. A two-coat varnishing would also help the splinter problem.


These tables have served our club many times in schools, hamfests, flea markets and Field Day operations. Storage

and/or transportation presents no problem.

Remember the slots are 6 inches deep, and as wide as the material is thick. Most of the cuts can be with a table saw, using a plywood tooth blade. Use a sabre saw for the slots so that the bottom of the slot will be square. The slots can be deepened slightly of the table does not level up correctly.

The whole structure lays flat after disassembly and can be stored in a minimum of space until needed again.

At 1745 local time TRW/ARC President Walt Pearson cal the meeting to order. The minutes of the last meeting were approved as printed in the Crosstalk. Paul Herbert handed out the semiannual Financial Report draft. Wike reported on the last Club picnic: only \$22.28 spent for the excellent food he and his XYL served. Hume indicated that the antenna tower is about to arrive. The logistics of receiving and storing the tower sections were discussed. The tower base situation is being worked by SEA officials. Walt reported that Joe O'Brien is working on a speaker for the next Club meeting. Bill Dews reported that the the Club has 153 members. suggested an ARRL membership drive. Bill Ivey reminded the Executive Board that the deadline for the mandatory semiannual financial report is August 15th, including the 1986 planning forecasts. Bill further stated that TRW SEA is willing to print up 7000 club membership drive leaflets for posting on bulletin boards. There will be a Family Day at TRW on the 28th of September. It was proposed that the Club participate by providing communications for the event. It was also pointed out that the Club Swapmeet is that day. Frank Cartier, our new Swapmeet Manager recruited 3 people to handle the upcoming Aug. 31 Swapmeet: Charlie Darrow, Ed Koran and Darwin Salisbury. Jim Cox gave an account of the 2 Meter repeaters: W6TRW is back on duty with a new tone decoder and courtesy tone. Control codes were given to John Keller who is one of the control operators. Jim said that the previous failure of the repeater was traced to a tripler-driver which drifted out of adjustment. repeater is working now with a reduced power output due to the unavailability of a replacement driver transistor. Needed is a 2N4427, and donations will be cheerful' accepted. Both repeaters need special lamps to repla ones that have burned out. Tentative approval was given to purchase the required lamps pending determination of cost. The new decoder has 3 separate on/off functions: repeater on/off, PL on/off and a spare on/off function. A spare decoder purchase was requested by Jim at a price of \$65. The board voted that Jim could purchase the decoder. Jim proposed to have a general technical/operations discussion on the repeater. Jim will schedule it with Joe O'Brien for a Club meeting. (ed. The following is printed under protest) A special commendation was extended to John Keller for his super job in typing, collating, organizing, computerizing, and expediting our Club paper, the Crosstalk. Jim Wike will monitor the preparations for our upcoming Annual Dinner. Jim Cox suggested that the best way to handle malicious interference on the repeater is to ignore it! adjourned the meeting at 1910 hours local time.

Those of you who frequent 2 Meters have probably noticed that there is a whole lot of beeping going on on the Club W6TRW repeater. Jim Cox, our Technical Chairman and guru of VHF recently put the W6TRW machine back in operation, and removed the W6NWP machine to add some upgrades to it and get it back to it's proper location at Garrett. A little difficulty, coined the "word eater" by Chris Wachs, was encountered that was traced to the tone decoder. The repeater will mute if tones from a touch tone pad are received and the audio level into the decoder was too high and it was muting from voice frequencies. Reducing the level cured the problem. Jim says that the repeater is putting out only about half

's normal power due to a overstressed driver transistor at took a beating when the repeater went down the last time. We are looking for a 2N4427 and will accept The beeping that's going on is a courtesy beep that tells you when the repeater has been reset. The "alligator" now resets when the input carrier is dropped and the beep tells you that the reset has taken place. Courtesy still says that you should give a little bit of dead air befor you jump on so that others trying to break get a chance to do so. If you have any ideas for improved operation of the repeater (forget an autopatch) please foward them to Jim Cox, John Keller or Chris Wachs,

This practice will not be tolerated and may result in the seller being required to leave. With this in mind, the TRW ARC Swapmeet policy is again published below:

TRW AMATEUR RADIO CLUB SWAPMEET POLICY

In keeping with the spirit of Amateur Radio to promote the hobby by helping those interested to gain the knowledge and equipment required for Amateur Radio, the TRW Amateur Radio Club sponsors a swapmeet. It is the intent of this Amateur Radio equipment swapmeet to provide a monthly meeting place for radio amateurs and experimenters to trade and exchange used amateur radio related equipment. Such equipment includes receivers, transmitters, antennas, test equipment, and electronic Computer hardware and software is also components. becoming related to amateur radio.

As a TRW Amateur Radio Club sponsored activity no fees are charged for the trading privileges. Instead, the Club askes the traders to cooperate by adhereing to the swapmeet rules that limit the types of items for trade to used amateur radio equipment. Small quantities of unused electronic components may be traded. In order to preserve the intent of this Club function, commercial vendors are not permitted. In general, the sale of new equipment is not permitted.

With the continued growth and popularity of the swapmeet, there has been a trend for traders to offer non-amateur radio related equipment in quantities equivalent to commercial vendors. Your cooperation to end such trends is requested.

Where there is a question as to whether the equipment offered is acceptable, the TRW Amateur Radio Club swapmeet supervisors will make a determination. Your cooperation with the swapmeet supervisors is requested. Lack of cooperation will result in trading privileges being suspended for the offender.

Lifetime General Radiotelephone Operator License

With just a few months left in this year, you are reminded that anyone holding a First Class, Second Class or General Radiotelephone Operator License issued or renewed between January 1, 1979 and June 14, 1984 is eligible to receive a lifetime license.

To receive your special lifetime license certificate, you must sent your request to the same FCC field office that issued you your last license. Include your name as it appears on your license, your date of birth, and your license number. Write the words "Lifetime License" above the Field Office's address. If your present license has an endorsement, you must submit a copy of that license with your request. Please enclose an SASE for sending the special certificate to you, at least 4 $1/8 \times 9 1/2$ with appropriate first class postage. If you want your special certificate delivered unfolded, please enclose a 9 1/2 x 12 inch envelope with the correct postage for the larger size envelope. Do no lose, damage or destroy your special certificate. Replacement certificates will not be available.


