Tidbits from the Jolly Little S...!

A Happy New Year to you all! I hope that your holiday was better than mine. Between the wife and I coming down with influenza and then bronchitis, it was not the best Christmas we have had. Anyway, this year is already looking better.

Two very important items must be touched upon first.

As of January 1, 1986 the FCC will no longer accept old 610 forms for renewal or upgrade. In addition, you can no longer use photocopied forms even if they are the latest version. You must send in the printed form on the goldenrod colored paper. Using any other type of form will only delay your renewal or upgrade. All VE's are aware of this and are ordering the forms from the FCC so that when you get tested you will fill out the correct form.

Second, the State of California now has a seat belt law. Enforcement of the law is up to the discretion of the city you are driving in and ranges from being given a warning if you are stopped for an infraction and are not wearing your belt, to being stopped and cited on the spot. The city that is getting tough is Glendale. Sounds like its time to get in the habit and Buckle Up!

The TRW Amateur Radio Club has been getting some really good national press recently. In the January 1986 issue of QST the TRW/ARC gets the nod twice. First, those intrepid testers, Chris Wachs, WA2KDL, Bill Dews, K6AWO, Frank Cartier, WA6RAY, Mike Ramirez, W6YLZ and Dave Hassall, WA5DJJ put the TRW/ARC on the top of the heap in the ARRL September VHF QSO Party. Not only did they win the Santa Barbara Section (they operated from atop Mt. Pinos) but they also were the Southwestern Division champs! To top that off they were the highest scoring 6 Area station, beating the next station by almost 2000 points (only 9 more QSOs) and the other station was working 5 bands, W6TRW was working 4! Absolutely fantastic job guys!! My hat is off to all of you!!

Also in the January 1986 issue of QST is a report that due to a \$3000 contribution from the Southwestern Division Hamcon that was held at the Queen Mary last summer, the Goldwater Scholarship has gone over the top of its \$50,000 goal. We were mentioned as one of the sponsoring clubs. A fine job was done by Paul Weisz, K6YQ, and all those that helped out at the convention!

In the December 1985 issue of QST, in the Technical Correspondence section, Training Chairman Paul Wisiolek, K1TKL, got a letter printed suggesting a method of sorting files, like QSO call signs, more rapidly by using the Shell-Metzner sort routine and using batch files and a RAM disk to speed things up. Paul warns that once you show yourself to be knowledgeable, you run the risk of being deluged with questions from others who you may not be able to help. It can also eat up a lot of your time!! Frank Mullen, W6SCL, wrote a nice letter with his membership renewal and it had an interesting note about Packet Radio. Frank is a retired member who lives up around Monterey and he said that during the fires up there last year the California Department of Forestry (CDF) used hams for communications. The CDF has a form that is used by the fire captains as a tool to get the most needed information transmitted as quickly as possible. The hams used Packet and just transmitted the information that went into the blanks on the form. At the receiver site a blank form was put into the printer and all the data appeared where it was supposed to. Fire Captains were delighted with the information and the CDF was quite pleased with the speed, efficiency, accuracy and convenience provided by the Ham Packet Radio system. By the way, for those of you who rarely look at the Crosstalk here are a few facts for you to mull over. For an inside mailing it costs the club about 25 cents per copy per month to print the newsletter. This does not include the 8 to 10 hours I spend on the typing and running around I do. So that means that of your \$5.00 you pay in dues, \$3.00 per year goes into the newsletter.

Executive Board Meeting 14 Jan 1985

Attending were Jim Cox, Bill Daley, Bill Dews, Scott Gilmartin, Paul Herbert, Dale Jensen, John Keller, Steve Ng, Walt Pearson, Chris Wachs, Jim Wike and Paul Wisiolek. President Chris Wachs called the meeting to order at 5:35 pm. Chris introduced the new members of the Executive Board to those present; Vice President Scott Gilmartin, Treasurer Dave Stockwell and High Tech Group Chairman Steve Ng. Chris asked that all board and staff members search for assistants during this year, to help with the job and to train someone to take over if the need should arise. Emergency Communications Coordinator Dale Jensen has put together a guide for ECT members and it will be used as an input to Security as how we define our interface to them during and emergency. Reaction to the ECT by Security up to this point has been very cool. Technical Chairman Jim Cox reported that the W6TRW repeater in E2 now has battery back-up emergency power. Jim further stated that the PL can be remotely disabled for community access during an emergency. Jim is holding a work party on Jan 18 to change out the repeater antenna and install the present antenna into the Club ham shack in Bldg 65. Ten 2 Meter handheld transceivers have been fitted with single tone PL's. The batteries in these radios were found to be completely depleted. Jim stated that if these radios are to be used for emergencies, the batteries must be discharged/charged on a regular basis. Much discussion was held on the method of keeping NiCad batteries operable. Club needs to find a person who will accept responsibility of looking after the radio batteries. Interested parties may contact any Executive Board or Staff member to volunteer. Vice President Scott Gilmartin reported that the speaker for the January meeting will be Mike Henderson, U.S. Sales Manager for Yaesu. Mike will have news on new equipment and handouts. Treasurer Dave Stockwell presented a proposed budget for 1986. It was moved and voted that the budget be accepted for review with modifications, if any, and approval to take place at the next EBM. Bill Daley gave his report on the last LAACARC meeting. Bill reminded the board that dues for LAACARC membership are now due. Membership Chairman Bill Dews stated that we have 105 members who have either renewed or are new members. Bill reported that his sweep of the December Swapmeet netted 20 new members, with more to follow. SEA Representative Paul Herbert presented information to the board on changes in the way SEA will be operated and changes that the Club will have to make within the year. Training Chairman Paul Wisiolek delivered a list of examinations that will be held in California that are coordinated by GLAARG. See elsewhere in Crosstalk for the list. Crosstalk Editor John Keller verified the mail stations and phone extensions of the board and staff members and reported that SEA will be installing a photocopier for use by the clubs to print up the newsletters. SEA has not yet worked out operating methods and availability of the copier. Steve Ng reported that he and Jim Wike are working out details for a group purchase of AEA PK-80 TNC's for those who do not own Commodore 64 or 128 computers and wish to get on Packet. See the article elsewhere in Crosstalk. Chris reported that AMSAT is looking for people to put together a satellite that will go into geosynchronous orbit. If you know anyone who loves to work on satellites and is fed up with the hassel of getting flight equipment out of TRW, let Chris know. AMSAT is not as picky about the hardware but the designs are good and the hardware works when put together. Chris also mentioned that the condition of the ham shack in Bldg 65 is deplorable!! A discussion arose as to whose responsibility the condition of the shack is and how we can insure that it remains clean once it is cleaned up. The meeting was adjourned at 7:10pm.

1] What TNC (Terminal Node Controller) should I get?

A TNC made by any company licensed to duplicate the design of the Tucson Amateur Packet Radio TNC-2. TAPR sold the design to various companies to make the TNC-2. A few of the companies which bought the design are: AEA, MFJ, GLB and Pac Comm.

2] How do I hook up a TNC to my computer?

Think of your TNC as a fancy modem. The TNC connects to an RS-232 (serial port) connector on your computer. The program will turn your computer into a terminal on which everything you type goes out the RS-232 connector to the TNC. Everything the TNC sends goes to the display of the computer. Some terminal programs allow you to send and receive data with a computer memory disk. That feature is nice for receiving programs and text and saving them.

3] What about the Packrat?

The Packrat, also known as the PK-64, is only for use with the Commodore 64 and 128 computers. It will not work on any other computers. If you do not have a computer, the least expensive alternative is to get a Commodore 64 (about \$120) and a PK-64 (about \$190) and use your TV as a display.
