Return of the Lost Handheld

At 2 p.m. Friday, Sept 16, I received a phone call from a reporter for the Daily Breeze who needed background info on Amateur Radio emergency message handling with the Caribbean during Hurricane Gilbert. I suggested the reporter and his photographer visit my home hamshack Friday evening when the bands were open so we could get on the air and communicate with the stricken area. They were in a big rush to get their article written so we agreed to meet at the TRW hamshack at 3 p.m. that afternoon. The hurried meeting, with a short on-the-air demonstration with two contacts in the Texas coastal area, did get accomplished. In rushing to get to my 4 p.m. doctors appointment, I somehow locked my keys in my car and while getting to a spare key I set my Icom-2AT on the roof of the car. You guessed it -- I drove off with the radio on the roof of the car and it tumbled off onto the street as I pulled out of the Bldg 65 parking lot. I did not miss the radio until I was southbound on the 405 freeway. I quickly got on my 2 M mobile rig and asked if anyone was listening and was near Bldg 65. I lucked out, and Scott, N6AZY, was near-by and was able to do a search of the parking lot and the Rosecrans exit. He could not find the lost radio. My 4 p.m. doctors appointment at Kaiser in Harbor City prevented me from returning for a further search. One positive thought went through my mind -- Scott had not reported finding bits and pieces of the radio scattered on the road, so no car had run over it. Another thought was that I had my name, address and phone number affixed to the radio and, with a little luck, some honest person would find it and call me. I was in luck -- an honest gentleman, Dan Ruggles, who worked at the El Segundo SCE plant, was the first vehicle to pass the spot where the radio was laying and he stopped and picked it up before it could get run over. He called me the following Monday evening and arranged to get the radio back to me. "Thank you, Dan!!!"

A lesson learned -- Don't sit anything on the roof of a car. I would also advise readers to label portable equipment, such as handheld radios, so that if they are lost they can be returned to you. Incidentally, the Icom-2AT handheld survived the nasty fall onto the pavement, probably due to the thick leather case protecting it. Thanks, again, Dan!

A Further History of the TRW/ARC

Last month we mentioned that the TRW/ARC Swap Meet was 10 years old. Well, digging through some old papers, I found a copy of the Ramo-Woolridge Corporation Review newsletter dated 16 August 1956. In it is an article about the Amateur Radio Association at R-W. The club was, at the time being run by a temporary steering committee and had only 20 FCC licensed members. The first big club project, according to the article, was going to be setting up a Club shack. Ed Page, one of the members of the steering committee, was quoted as saying "As the company grows and new facilities are completed in other parts of the nation, this club will increase in importance and size." With well over 250 members today, we definitely have grown. One name stuck out in the article, though. Stan Johnson, W6EEK, was a member of both the temporary steering committee and the Club's first permanent steering committee. Oh, Club meetings were held every 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month back then in the Building 2 Auditorium.

Directions:

From 405 South, get off at Hawthorne Blvd. Take Hawthorne south all the way to Silver Spur Road (approx. 8-9 miles) and turn left. Reubens will be immediately on the right.

From 405 North, get onto the 110 (Harbor Fwy) south to Crenshaw Blvd and turn left. Take Crenshaw to Silver Spur Road and turn right. Go past the Courtyard Mall (now called the Shops at Palos Verdes) and turn left into the parking lot at Silver Arrow Drive. Reubens will be at the right of the parking lot.
