TOURNAMENT OF ROSES RADIO AMATEURS

The day of the 1992 Rose Parade is rapidly approaching, and it is time to distribute assignment information and credentials necessary for you to provide communication assistance to Tournament of Roses personnel. The credentialing packets will be distributed at two meetings, WEDNESDAY DECEMBER 11, 1991 and TUESDAY DECEMBER 17, 1991; both meetings will begin at 7:00 PM at the TOURNAMENT HOUSE, 391 Orange Grove Boulevard in Pasadena. It is absolutely essential that you attend ONE of the two meetings to pick up your assignment information and credentials packet. We will also be discussing last minute instructions and answering any specific questions you may have.

A lot of behind the scenes effort has gone into registering over 350 TORRA operators and assigning them to almost 300 positions. activity is not limited to voice communications, but also includes amateur television and portable packet radio. The period just before the credentialing meetings is the most critical in that we are finalizing assignments and printing the assignment labels. If you receive this letter, we assume that you will be available for an assignment. If you know that you will not be available for a New Years assignment, PLEASE call Cliff (KB6IA) at (213) 257-3293 (home, evenings) or (213) 894-5530 during normal work hours as soon as possible so that we can assign someone else to your position. It is very time consuming when we have to contact each of you who failed to pick up your packet at either of the credentialing meetings only to find that you will not be available. We then have to call standby operators, many of whom are toll calls, explain their assignments, and make arrangements for them to pick up their packets. In summary, please show some courtesy, and let us know if you will not be available so we can make other arrangements. Also, if you find that after receiving your packet you will be unable to participate because of an unforeseen emergency, please let us know as soon as possible so we can make other arrangements. Your participation is appreciated by the Tournament of Roses Association and TORRA, and we look forward to another successful New Years event.

Don't forget the TORRA net that meets every Thursday evening (nightly after Christmas) at 7:27PM on 147.27+ for last minute instructions. Volunteers can be registered and last minute assignments will be announced. We are still in need of additional volunteers, so please pass the word among your amateur friends and clubs. Please be sure to RSVP per Tournament instructions if you plan to attend the Tournament of Roses reception so they may plan for the proper number of attendees. This is an important opportunity to meet the Committee Chairman and get an idea of what they want from their communicators.

Club Survey Results Update:

We have received 40 survey responses to date, thanks to all who took the time to help. Of those who responded 37% hold Extra Class licenses, 30% Advanced, 8% General, 18% Technician and 2% Novice tickets. Fifty eight percent have been licensed over 20 years, 8% 11-20 years, 8% 6-10 years and 26% less than 5 years. The reasons for joining the club were evenly distributed between the swapmeet, Field Day, the Bldg 65 shack, support for the W6TRW repeater and just plain keeping in touch with our hobby.

The most popular activities are the swapmeet, Field Day, Emergency Communications, use of the club shack and club meetings. As far as interests go HF(76%) closely followed by VHF(68%) were the most popular. Other significant interests are UHF(53%), DX(50%), CW(47%), and computers(39%). Seventy five percent of the respondents prefer noon meetings but 67% seldom attend. Eighty six percent seldom use the club shack.

Most of those who replied attend the swapmeet regularly and are not sellers (77%); sixty eight percent indicated a willingness to help. Sixty percent are in favor of holding VE exams after the swapmeet and 77% feel the club should offer entry level classes.

I have ARRL VE manuals and applications, call me if you are interested. We need a volunteer to run the VE test sessions and another to be training chairman. I can only handle one job with my present workload. 73 de KJ6GR.

TRW ARC 40 METER NET:

For the past couple of years TRW ARC members who operate in the HF bands have been getting together on 40 Meters, Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6 PM PST. The net had been carried on 7.253 MHz until recently when QRM got heavy and we switched to 7.185 MHz. We lost a few operators during the frequency switch and hope the announcement of the new frequency will see the return of the lost operators (assuming they have Advanced or Extra tickets. Ed.). A list of regulars on the net are Bill, K6AWS (Idaho), Bill, K6AWO, Frank, W6SCL (Monterey), Bill, KE6LB (Ramona), Wayne, KI6GM, Al, W6KQI (Tehachapi), Merwin, K6RL (Tehachapi) and Herb, W6FQ. Typically 4-6 members show up on the net and we have some very interesting discussions including very chilly weather reports from K6AWS in Idaho. A BRIEF TEST ON AN ISOLOOP

I had a chance to use two basic instruments to check an Isoloop. It was an interesting and educational test. A brief rundown follows:

Instruments: MFJ 204B Ant. Bridge with a Freq. Counter

MFJ 202B Noise Bridge with S-meter in rovr

MFJ 815B SWR/Wattmeter

Antenna : AEA Isoloop with about 45' coax

The instruments were not of lab. type and hence the readings were approximate. Nevertheless, they gave a good correlation of the results as shown below and were close enough for 'ham' purposes. Since the antenna was remotely tuned for minimum VSWR, only one freq was tested in each ham band from 14 to 30 Mhz. A chart was also plotted.

The data in the 28Mhz region did not check out with the mfr's (<2). Since the ant was mounted on a sundeck and was only two feet higher than the roof nearby (which was also two feet away), I suspect that its location had affected the readings. This was a 'portable' installation and because of its light weight, it could be put down in windy days or during vacation time!

This antenna is not for dx use. However, I had made contacts with OZ, VK, JH among others. It is compact with a performance, I believe, equals to that of a dipole of omnidirectional characteristics (horizontally mounted), but with a freq coverage ratio of 2:1. (The latest version has a ratio of 3:1) Because of its narrowband characteristics, while minimizing the noise spectrum at the aame time, a tuning indicator for reflection power is a must.
