#### HF Ramblings

I was pleasantly surprised over the past few months by the many new HF rigs offered by ICOM. Their new top-of-the-line rig, the IC-775 and 775DSP, is sure to be a competitor to the FT-1000 and the TS-950. Those of you considering a high end rig purchase should wait and see what QST says about this one before parting with any of your hard earned cash. The IC-706 is aimed at the mobile and portable market with HF plus 6 and 2 meter coverage in one radio. The front panel is remoteable and the receiver tunes 30 KHz to 200 MHz. If the performance is on a par with the TS-60 and FT-900 it should be a best seller.

Now these will not be cheap rigs and some of you newcomers may not want to spend over \$1500 on a first rig. I've written many times about the virtues of QRP as a way to get started on HF and there is good news here too. Oak Hills Research has announced a new 4 band QRP transceiver kit for the 80,40,30 and 20 meter bands. From the description provided to me by Young Ryu, AB6UP it looks like a derivative of their excellent Spirit model. Oak Hills kits are first class and so is their performance. The price is under \$360 and I'll make the same offer I've made before and help any newcomer align the radio after they build it. I wish I had some spare time as this kit would make an excellent portable rig.

I hear east coast QRP stations often on 40 and 30 meters in the early evenings. They don't come pounding in but are workable. Stations in the Pacific North-West and northern California are usually very strong and provide many hours of enjoyable rag chewing for me. There are many QRP nets on the low bands and they welcome newcomers. Checking into a net is a great way to start out on QRP and get an idea how strong signals are.

A much expanded version of the Shortwave Propagation Handbook by George Jacobs, W3ASK and Theodore Cohen, N4XX has recently been published by CQ Communications, Inc. The NEW Shortwave Propagation Handbook adds a third author, Robert Rose, K6GKU and contains all a ham needs to know about this important subject. The most modern theories and data are presented as well as a good discussion of available propagation software. This is a must have book in my opinion.

For those who are still unsure if they want to give HF a try come out and join the club on Field Day. There will be plenty of chances to operate on any band or mode, you can guest op even if you aren't yet licensed.

## W6TRW Packet Radio Internet Gateway On the Air

In January, I asked the TRW ARC Executive Board to allow me to set up a packet radio Internet gateway for W6TRW. In May, the W6TRW gateway was completed and is now on the air!

I had help from many club members including Dave Bloodgood, KD6PRO, Terry Thompson, KB6CUT, and John Bien of TRW network services who helped with the TRW end.

Rich, N6CIZ, wanted me to write a *Crosstalk* article about the gateway. I will write first what the gateway is and then how to use it with a standard packet radio setup.

An Amateur Radio Internet Gateway is a packet system that is connected to the Internet. With our Internet connection we can move packet data at speeds of 1 million bytes a second to almost anywhere in the world with very high reliability and then back out to packet radios at the other end.

#### Using the Gateway

Using the W6TRW gateway on packet it is very easy. The easiest way is to set your radio to the packet repeater on 146.745 (-600) and connect to W6TRW-3. Hit return after the connection and you will have the BBS menu. Enter Help or ? to see what the commands do. If you can't reach the packet repeater directly on 146.745, connect to any netrom node and look for TCPTRW or W6TRW-3 in the nodes list. You then connect to the BBS using netrom.

What can you do on the BBS? I enjoy the QSO Conference Bridge where there are QSO's from all over the world taking place and you can join in. To get to the Conference Bridge, enter CONV at the BBS prompt or connect to W6TRW-6 on 146.745 (-600).

You can receive bulletins using the AREAS command. Just enter AF at the BBS prompt to see what bulletin areas there are. Bulletin categories can be added to include other areas of interest. Anyone logged into the BBS can access the bulletins.

You can also send mail to other users of the gateway or to any packet radio station.

The gateway can also act as a digepeater. The digepeater call sign is W6TRW-10. If you know another gateway, you can digepeat to them using our gateway digepeat feature.

Advanced users who have TCP/IP running with their packet stations can automatically route their packets through the gateway. A simple note to the sysop will add them to the "route table" and they're ready to use the gateway.

#### A Resource for the Ham Radio Community

The TRW ARC Internet gateway is a new resource offered by the club for club members and other amateur radio operators in southern California. The gateway is also for you and can grow with the club as we find new uses for it. I will talk about these other features in my next article about the gateway. In the near term, any feedback about the current operation will be useful to me.

Together, they held the net in the parking lot and the first Bob and Ray Show was on the air.

Since then, the net has taken to the road, operating from locations ranging from the end (the over the water end!) of the Manhattan Beach pier to an El Segundo street to a fast food joint's parking lot. It's also added Rich as a producer/writer/director and phone answerer.

Recently, the net was "syndicated" when the Hughes Amateur Radio Club began simulcasting the "Bob and Ray Show" on their 440 MHz repeater! Proof positive that it's become more than just a run of the mill club net.

Everyone is invited to listen and participate in the club net every Thursday night at 6:30. Just tune in to the 2 meter repeater, sit back, and enjoy. After all, we do it for you!

## **FCC Details Proposed Rule Changes**

From ARRL Headquarters Newington CT May 9, 1995

The FCC has issued a Notice of Proposed Rule Making on several changes in amateur service rules. Details are given below.

#### Volunteer Examiners • Exam Credit • Club Licenses

The FCC proposes to designate one volunteer examiner of a team as the examination session manager, saying that would increase "examination efficiency." The FCC said that continuing to require at least three VEs to be present would preserve the protection of cross-checking, as sought by the ARRL.

The Commission also proposes to give examination credit to former licensees, as requested by the ARRL in RM-8418. The FCC said the League's position had merit, and the proposed new rule would allow VEs to give exam element credit for any exam the applicant had previously passed. In addition, the FCC asks for comments on criteria "it should use" to allow credit on amateur exams for other types of formerly and currently held US operator licenses and foreign licenses.

The FCC also agreed with the ARRL proposal in RM-8462 that bona fide Amateur Radio clubs should comprise a minimum of four people in order to be eligible for a club station license and proposes a rule to that effect.


#### One-by-One Call Signs for Special Event Stations • Portable Indicators


In response to an ARRL request as part of the vanity call sign program, the Commission proposes to make one-by-one call signs available to special event stations. Requests for such call signs would have to be made 120 days in advance; the period of the special call sign would be 15 days or for the duration of the event, whichever is shorter. The application would have to state the nature of the event and include a list of requested call signs in order of preference.

Finally, the FCC also proposes to allow portable indicators to be included before, after, or both before and after, the assigned call sign. This was, the FCC said, in response to several informal requests for clarification of its rule 97.119(c).

The comment deadline for these proposals, in WT Docket 95-57, is July 14, 1995. The reply comment deadline is August 14, 1995.
