Field Day 2007 will be on June 23-24 this year. This year Field Day falls on a weekend that does not conflict with the Swap Meet and many people have that Friday off. So I am hoping we get a big turnout for both the Friday set-up and during the 24 hour operating period on Saturday and Sunday.

As we've noted in W6TRW Crosstalk articles and at the W6TRW club meetings, we are planning on having four HF stations plus VHF/UHF and Special Modes demonstrations.

40m CW - Bill Shanney


VHF/UHF - Jim Harrison

As you can see, we are still looking to fill in two band captain slots that are sure to offer excellent operating opportunities. 40m SSB will likely be a great band this year. The propagation predictions indicate that late at night that band is going to stretch out all the way to the East Coast. I've dedicated the 20m CW beam antenna to serve the 2m HF Digital station this year so whoever volunteers to run that station will have probably one of the best antenna heads for that mode on the West Coast. Please contact me ASAP if you are interested. What I need now is a focal point who I can work with to make sure we don't miss anything as we bring all the gear together. The time imposition is minimal. I just can't assemble all the logistics alone. Help!

We can also use more operators. Bill Shanney is looking for more people to help run the CW station during the night to keep racking up the CW points on 40m. It would be awesome to see a few more people running that mode.

I'm still hoping to add one more HF station if we can muster people who can team together to operate SSB voice at a more casual pace. We have an awesome



15 meter beam that will serve well the day time and likely well into the evening given the propagation predictions. Please consider signing up to either mentor or operate for an hour or two and we'll be sure to put this system together. Then we can operate in the 5A-LAX category.














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W6TRW Club Members Support MBPD With DUI Checkpoint!

DUI Check Point

It is Memorial Weekend and it is time to remember and thank our Veterans. We thank the men and women whom are currently serving our great nation and those that have gone on. There is something else that is being served up this Memorial weekend. It's in the form of a Driving Under the Influence (DUI) check point. The South Bay Regional DUI Task Force, also know as "Avoid the Twelve" for the twelve participating departments made up of local South Bay Police Departments, the California Highway Patrol & the Los Angeles County Sheriff Department. Funded from grants (translation: your tax dollars) from the State of California, Office of Traffic & Safety, there is a DUI check point from 2000 to 0400 in the morning.

It's always a very interesting night for the Northrop Grumman employee's whom make up a large contingency of the Manhattan Beach Traffic Volunteers and tonight's DUI check point will certainly be no different.

The DUI check point took place East bound Rosecrans just West of Aviation Boulevard, narrowing four lanes down to just two. After setting up our staging area for field sobriety checks and a place for the nurse to draw blood from suspected drivers under heated and lighted EZ-up tents, we are ready to begin.





California Highway Patrol MOBAT

A rather large California Highway Patrol MOBAT (Mobil Breath Analyzer Truck) that resembles a Recreational Vehicle that doesn't take you camping pulls up. Numerous tow trucks, hundreds of traffic cones and delineators are put in place that make up the check point, along with three lighted arrow signs, DUI check point signs. Numerous police cars & motorcycles are in place, as well as probably twenty-six sworn personnel and six community service officer's (CSO's) to help process paper work and transport arrestees. And eight traffic volunteers.



Dinner is Served!

We are served dinner at 2000 and with our stomach full from yummy Mexican soft taco dinner that we are always thankful for, we are ready to begin by 2100 hours. The volunteers are assigned to the duty of driving suspect drunk drivers cars from the line after officers have conducted and decided that a more through Field Sobriety Test (FST) is needed. The volunteers are used so that officer's aren't removed from their duties by having to stop and

move a vehicle. This allows them to stay on the checkpoint looking for suspects. On this night some of the other MBPD traffic volunteers are assigned to the Drivers License checkpoint which is located just forward of the DUI checkpoint. Tonight's

checkpoint is both a DUI and a driver's license checkpoint. It works like this: the motorist is told that they have entered a DUI checkpoint and asked by the officer if he or she has consumed any alcoholic or sometimes they just ask you where are coming from tonight. The person speaking or just sitting in the vehicle in most cases is all it takes for the officer to smell the Alcohol on the driver. Sometimes the motorist will just say that had been to dinner or a party some where and that they had a few alcoholic beverages. If the officer observes the person to be impaired via a simple eye movement test that the officers are trained to pre form, they maybe asked to submit to further field sobriety testing or they maybe determined that no further testing in necessary and be just told to drive safely and sent on their way after they can show a valid drivers license.

If they are unable to provide the valid drivers license they are directed by that officer over to the coned off two lane area to be met by a group of awaiting Police Officers whom will conduct a computer check on the motorist license stats. A MBPD volunteer points out the way to the motorist to this area so that no question should arise as to where the motorist is to enter the Drivers license checkpoint point.

At 0132 in the morning MBPD volunteer/NCG own, Mike Hamada (KF6UCN) was at the receiving end of a motorist that decided that he was not going to stop for any DUI check point and after blowing through the DUI portion of the checkpoint Mike found himself trying to direct the driver over to the drivers license area without much success. Mike kept shining his flash light at the motorist and attempted to direct him into the coned off area where more police officers are staged. The errant driver

made a quick turn and drove around Mike. The officers quickly jumped into the awaiting pursuit car and took off after him along with three or four motorcycle officers with blaring sirens in tow. The chase was on! The pursuit continued up Rosecrans and South on Aviation Blvd. then turned West bound on Marine Ave. before the errant driver pulled over and gave up to pursuing officers at Marine & Redondo Ave. That woke us all up!

The motorist was a bartender at one of the Hermosa Beach bars (Sharkeez) and was subsequently arrested for, I believe, numerous charges--including DUI. You can run from the Police but you can't run far.

Most people that enter the DUI/Drivers License checkpoint are very cooperative and supportive of the check point but some are not. More than a few times we had motorists enter the checkpoint too fast which raises big flags and upsets the Police. There we are, with no where to get out of the way, standing in the middle of the street with just a stupid traffic cone to hide behind. One motorist drove in at a high rate of speed and the officer's began to yell to slow down and when he finally came to a stuttering stop he was removed form the car. There he stood wobbling and weaving. He clearly was having difficultly standing and was subsequently arrested for DUI. As Homer Simpson would say, "Do-oh!" Driving into a DUI check point really fast isn't going to necessarily get you in/out of the check point any quicker. But if your goal is to get arrested quicker, you will be immediately served by several unhappy Police Officers!

The Police Officer's reaction could have gone a bunch of different directions. The Officer simply, and very matter-of-factly, asked the driver why he had the rifle in the back seat and the young motorist explained that it was a BB rifle. The Officer just opened up the rear door, looked at the rifle and confirmed that it was just a BB gun and searched around the immediate area. Nothing else found, so no crime and the young men continued on their way.

Lesson learned? Probably not a great idea to drive around with a BB gun in the back seat of your car! You never know when you might get stopped by the police. Or have to drive through a DUI checkpoint!



VE TESTING - there will be VE testing for all classes of licenses, including Morse code testing if you so desire, and an outdoor swapmeet.




